Annex 8, Hawaiian cases challenging U.S. legality and jurisdiction

These cases would include State v. Pulawa, (1977); Proceedings against Attorney Hayden F. Burgess in Federal District Court, Hawai (1978 circa) followed by a challenge to withdraw the license to practice law before the Hawaii Disciplinary Council; U.S. v. Raymond Kamaka, U.S. District Court for the District of Hawaii where a Hawaiian farmer is sent to prison for Federal tax violation in which he challenges the authority of the U.S. Colonial administration to assess taxes upon him, U.S. v. John Marsh, U.S District Court for the District of Hawaii and Internal Revenue Service v. John Marsh in the Federal Tax Court, Hawaii District where a retired Police Officer challenges the jurisdiction of the taxing authority, and most recently State of Hawaii v. Andrea L. June in the 1<sup>st</sup> Circuit Court of the State of Hawaii, 2019 where a young mother is prosecuted for driving without a license as she attempted to return two young children in her care to their home, and threatened with a minimum one year imprisonment (See Annex 9 et seq).
